Art + Practice collaborates with museums on its campus to organize exhibitions. Museums take charge of proposing and organizing the events with selected artists. A+P aids in co-organizing and setting up, but not selecting artists. We focus on the connection between theory and practice, which affect each other reciprocally. Presenting art through various means is equally important as verbalizing experiences in articles. Artistic development equals research areas under Norwegian law. Throughout the semester, you'll present your practice in a group seminar, including documentation, contextual references, and critical reflection. Additionally, you'll contribute to a group project presented within a public context. While we emphasize independent development, we encourage you to attend lectures, presentations, seminars, and workshops as available. A+P is proud to collaborate with museum institutions to organize exhibitions on our campus. These exhibitions are proposed, planned, and organized by the museums in partnership with the artists they select. We assist with co-organizing and installing the exhibition but do not involve ourselves in selecting the artists. Can I volunteer? Yes!
