instead it's used to lengthen the sound of the previous letter. For example, yağmur (rain) isn't pronounced yag-moor, but yah-moor. To make it easier, pretend the ğ is a soft h sound. The most important tip of all — Don't be nervous about messing up! Turkish love when someone practices their language and will go out of their way to help you. If
